

STATE OF THE ART

The 'State of the Art' project is a comprehensive literature review of research on small-scale fisheries taken place around the world. It is developed as part of an online *Information System on Small-Scale Fisheries* (ISSF; issf.toobigtoignore.net), which aims at enhancing knowledge and importance of small-scale fisheries worldwide.

Data sources:

- 156 peer-reviewed papers, book chapters, theses, newsletters and conference proceedings.
- Publication year ranging from 1973 to 2014.

TECHNICAL ASPECTS

RESEARCH SETTING

The majority of publications in this region focused on research problems at a **sub-national** scale.

Communication and planning at a local level however, is increasingly being documented as a fundamental step toward effective fisheries management.

MARKET CHAIN



- The increasing wealth of East and South Asia continues to create a stronger demand for the marine resources of the South Pacific.
- The capture and sale of ornamental species for the aquarium trade is unique to this regions small-scale fisheries.




HOW ARE SMALL-SCALE FISHERIES REFERRED TO IN THIS REGION?


67 publications use small-scale, 36 use artisanal, 34 use subsistence

RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

- Ecological, governance, and social themes have increased at a similar rate since the early 2000s.
- Governance themes have emphasized the emerging role of community-based management systems, often in response to poor compliance and enforcement.
- Social themes have explored poverty and vulnerability among small-scale fishers as well as livelihood dependence and potential alternatives.
- Economic themes have been largely limited to financial analyses of struggling small-scale fisheries fleets.

GEOGRAPHIC EMPHASIS

East Asia: Diversifying fisheries into tourism as an alternate livelihood.

South Asia: Community involvement in fisheries management and resilience in the wake of natural disasters.

Oceania: Evolution of the artisanal fisher.
