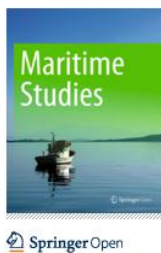
4) Fish as Food” cluster – two calls for abstracts

- a) An article titled “[Governability assessment of the Galapagos Marine Reserve](#)” has recently been published in the *Maritime Studies* journal. The article, written by María José Barragán Paladines (TBTI member) and Ratana Chuenpagdee (TBTI Project Director) argues that the governability of the Galapagos Marine Reserve can be improved by making governance processes more transparent and by better consideration of the social component in the governing system.
