4) Fish as Food" cluster – call for abstracts





6) New TBTI publications



a) Andrew Song (TBTI member) has recently written an article titled 'Human dignity: A fundamental guiding value for a human rights approach to fisheries?'. The article, published as an open access article in Marine Policy, explores the meaning of human dignity and its conceptual linkage to human rights. The author shows that human dignity represents a subtle but significant shift in how we approach human rights thinking and provides timely guidance for human rights implementation in fisheries.



b) Between a rock and a hard place – The need for and challenges to implementation of Rights Based Fisheries Management in small-scale fisheries of southern Lake Malawi' is a new article written by TBTI members Mafaniso Hara and Friday Njaya that explores the decline in commercially valuable fish species in the Lake Malawi. The authors argue that Rights Based Management (RBM) might be the best hope for moving towards sustainable fisheries management in the area and stress the need for a broad human rights approach for fishing communities.



c) Maria Jose Barragan Paladines, TBTI Senior Research Fellow's article 'How do users of the Galapogos Marine Reserve imagine it?' has recently been published in the Galapagos Report 2013-2014. Her study discusses the images held by the users of Galapogos Marine Reserve and outlines the most common images of the reserve, exploring how they were formed, and describing how they influence governance of the reserve.
