Dr. Larry Felt, a TBTI member, good friend and associate of many TBTI members, passed away on April 1st, 2016. Larry was a Professor at the Department of Sociology, Memorial University with interests in Maritime Sociology, Fisheries, Socio-Economic Development, and Newfoundland. He was also a founding director of the Atlantic Salmon Conservation Foundation (ASCF) and instrumental in building the ASCF into a major contributor to wild Atlantic Salmon Conservation.
