Too Big To Ignore (TBTI) is pleased to announce a call for contributions for an upcoming "photo e-book" publication on "The meaning of small: Diverse values of small-scale fisheries". This volume is coordinated by TBTI "Diverse Values" research cluster, which advocates for better understanding and enhanced knowledge about the importance of small-scale fisheries and their various contributions to the society. Through the study of values, we will gain appreciation for what matters to the people and what is desirable to society. Further, understanding what these values are, how they differ between different regions, and how they influence decisions can lead to better natural resource arrangements.

TBTI aims to portray this plethora of core values through the e-book publication by using visual stimuli such as infographs and photos to convey what small-scale fisheries mean in particular places.
