4) New publications by TBTI and members


a) Special Issue: Fisheries and Food Systems - Cross pollinations and synthesis

Developed through the TBTI 'Fish as Food' cluster, this special issue explores the importance of SSF to food systems and food security at local, regional, and global levels. The four articles that have been published so far in this collection cover the following issues:

- integration of fisheries and agricultural programs for food security;
- importance of sardine for food security and nutrition in South Africa and Tanzania;
- role of inland fishery and aquaculture for food and nutrition security in Nepal;
- food security and local fish and shellfish in Southcentral Alaska.

b) Article: Grand Challenges in the Management and Conservation of North American Inland Fishes and Fisheries

Several TBTI members and their colleagues recently published a feature paper in which they discuss critical roadblocks whose removal would help solve important problems in the management and long-term conservation of North American inland fish and fisheries. The major



themes identified are to (1) raise awareness of diverse values associated with inland fish and fisheries, (2) govern inland fish and fisheries to satisfy multiple use and conservation objectives, and (3) ensure productive inland fisheries given nonfishing sector externalities.

c) Article: Small-Scale Fisheries versus Whale-Watching Tourism: The Story of Puerto López

TBTI cluster coordinator María José Barragán Paladines wrote a short overview of the systematic decline of the fishing industry in Puerto López, Ecuador. This article centers around the notion of fish as food and around the shift away from fishing and towards activities connected with whale-watching tourism.

d) Research story: Sustaining 'life below water and on land' through collaboration, stewardship and reciprocity: Lessons from dolphins, seagulls and fishermen

TBTI member Prateep Nayak wrote a short reflection piece about the lessons learned from his research on 'life below water' and 'life on land' that can inform the implementation of Sustainable Development Goals 14 and 15. The lessons are drawn from the fisheries practice in Bay of Bengal coast of India and Community Forest Management from the Eastern Ghats Mountain Ranges.

e) Letter: Poor fisheries struggle with U.S. import rule

A group of researchers, including several TBTI members, wrote a letter regarding the recent U.S. import rule requiring that seafood imported into the U.S. must come from fisheries that comply with the Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA). The authors believe that exporting nations will have trouble achieving and documenting compliance with the MMPA within the 5-year grace period, which will ultimately have negative impacts on both marine mammal and fish populations.
