


#### 1) TBTI newest layer to ISSF: Country Statistics

**Country Statistics** is the newest dataset in our Information System on Small-Scale Fisheries (ISSF).

This major update provides ISSF users with an **interactive choropleth map**, which gives a visual display of fisheries statistics at the country level. At this time, the choropleth map displays the following sets of data: 1) **Marine Catch** (Tonnes), 2) **Marine Catch** (\$), 3) **Inland Catch** (Tonnes), 4) **SSF Subsidies** (\$) and 5) **Proportion of SSF vs. LSF Subsidies**.

### 2) New publications by TBTI and members

a) Article: The global information system on small-scale fisheries (ISSF) – A crowdsourced knowledge platform

ISSF is a Web-based, open data portal to collect and disseminate knowledge on various aspects of SSF. The system enables local description, regional comparisons, and large-scale syntheses, which can be helpful for demarginalization of SSF and improving governance.

Developed through the TBTI 'Global Synthesis' cluster, the paper describes the conception of ISSF and its key features. The authors discuss results extracted from the analysis of ISSF data, illustrating the importance of such a global database on SSF.

The paper, published in Marine Policy, is written by TBTI members Ratana Chuenpagdee, Delphine Rocklin, David Bishop, Matthew Hynes, Randal Greene, Miguel R. Lorenzi and Rodolphe Devillers.







## 3) TBTI activities report

a) Official launch of the Small-Scale Fisheries Guidelines book

'The Small-Scale Fisheries Guidelines: Global Implementation' book was officially launched at the FAO Fisheries Administration seminar on 'A transdisciplinary approach to sustainable small-scale fisheries' on June 30<sup>th</sup> in Rome, Italy. Book editors Svein Jentoft, Ratana Chuenpagdee, and Nicole Franz presented the book in Rome and Álvaro Otárola from Incopesca provided a commentary about the implementation of the SSF Guidelines in Costa Rica.

The second book launch was at the MARE "People and the Sea IX" conference on July 7<sup>th</sup> in Amsterdam, The Netherlands, where close to 30 out of 94 book contributors were presented to celebrate this achievement, with the four editors, Svein Jentoft, Ratana Chuenpagdee, María José Barragán-Paladines, and Nicole Franz. The launch followed the special session, 'The small-scale fisheries guidelines: Global Implementation,' organized by TBTI, and which was based on the book chapters.

The special session and the MARE book launch attracted a great interest from the conference audience. As stressed by the editors and contributors, the book is a collaborative effort that sends a strong message about the strength of the small-scale fisheries community and the relevance of the SSF Guidelines.

Memorial already has strong connections to Thailand through Ratana Chuenpagdee, TBTI Director, who is a




