1) TBTI newest layer to ISSF: Country Statistics

Country Statistics is the newest dataset in our Information System on Small-Scale Fisheries (ISSF).

This major update provides ISSF users with an **interactive choropleth map**, which gives a visual display of fisheries statistics at the country level. At this time, the choropleth map displays the following sets of data: 1) **Marine Catch** (Tonnes), 2) **Marine Catch** (\$), 3) **Inland Catch** (Tonnes), 4) **SSF Subsidies** (\$) and 5) **Proportion of SSF vs. LSF Subsidies**.

Svein Jentoft, TBTI cluster coordinator, recently gave an interview to SeafoodSource, a leading online source for global seafood industry news, trends, expo coverage and



business resources. Among others, Dr. Jentoft stressed the importance of contextualizing the SSF Guidelines to fit local circumstances, as demonstrated by the 34 case studies in the book. TBTI book on the SSF Guidelines launched in Mexico City

The 9th of August was a remarkable day for promoting sustainable artisanal fishing in Mexico.

The Fisheries and Aquaculture Commission of the Senate, FAO, TBTI and Comunidad y Biodiversidad A.C. (COBI)* organized the launch of the TBTI book 'Small-Scale Fisheries Guidelines: Global Implementation'.

The event was hosted by the Commission of Fisheries and Aquaculture of the Senate of the Republic and was attended by legislators, civil servant, researchers, fish producers and traders, civil organizations and the media.

During the event, Dr. Silvia Salas, TBTI representative from CINVESTAV, Mérida, introduced the book and talked about the efforts at the national and global scale for ensuring the sustainability of artisanal fisheries in Mexico. In addition, participants read excerpts from the chapter #20 in the book, written by Espinosa-Romero et al., which specifically explores civil society contributions to the implementation of the SSF Guidelines in Mexico.
